A timeline of London emergencies

The Great Plague of London 1665-6

Initially ignored by Parliament as a 'foreign problem', Yersinia Pestis (The Plague) took hold of London and raged over the course of nearly a year, destroying nearly one in four of the inhabitants: over 90,000 people. While the rich fled to the countryside, London's poor suffered the most because of overcrowded living conditions and the necessity to keep working in 'frontline' jobs. Celebrated diarist Samuel Pepys documented these events.

The Great Fire of London 1666

Probably started in a bakery in Pudding Lane, the fire of London destroyed the homes of an estimated 70,000 of the city's 80,000 inhabitants. Although only about 15 people were noted dead, the deaths of the poor were often not recorded. It's likely the fire could have been contained had Lord Mayor Thomas Bloodworth sanctioned the pulling down of houses but he feared the wrath of their owners.

The Gordon Riots 1780

What began as a protest about the Papists Act of 1778 became a way for the poorest citizens to vent their rage about their meagre pay and their inhuman working conditions. Debtors were released from London's prisons by the mob and rich peoples' homes were looted and burned. The army was called out to restore order, shooting 285 people dead. Ignatius Sancho was a well-to-do writer, composer and abolitionist and shopkeeper, who wrote fascinating letters observing London life. He was the first person of African descent to vote in a British general election.

The Colney Hatch Fire 1903

A fire in a shoddily built dormitory at this asylum for the 'pauper insane' killed 52 female patients. At the trial, the Home Secretary and other officials were blamed for sanctioning the highly flammable structure. The main buildings of Colney Hatch are now luxury apartments.

World War II air raids 1940s

During World War Two, German air raids resulted in many buildings being destroyed and mass civilian casualties. While others ran for their lives to shelters, Londoners as young as 14 were employed to guard rooftops, trying to put out incendiary bombs and save buildings.

The London Riots 2011

When police shot Mark Duggan, a black man said to be carrying a gun, protests erupted in Tottenham, which quickly spread across London and then the country. Resulting in widespread looting, vandalism of buildings and fires.

The Tower Block Fires 1999, 2005, 2009, 2017

Total death toll: 82. One in Garnock Court, three in Harrow Court, six in Lakanal House, 72 in Grenfell Tower. In all four fires, councils were condemned for sanctioning unsafe building materials for social housing. In the case of Grenfell Tower, no one has yet been held criminally responsible for the tragedy.

Covid 2020 to present

Covid19 took hold in the Spring of 2020. The under privileged, the aged and global majority Londoners have been disproportionately affected alongside those working in frontline jobs.
